

The 'city', or world, manifests in N dimensions; characteristically we will intersect it with a surface (or manifold) of M < N dimensions – call this intersection a *slice*.

We are accustomed to N = 3, M = 2.



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Let's consider 3 2 examples.



Post boxes: utility and beauty

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It is unarguable [?] fun to collect postboxes like stamps.

But their seeking encourages us to look hard in unusual ways as we move through the world.



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- Move randomly until you encounter a post box. (or see the website for a map of boxes in central Huddersfield).
- 2 Record the first letter of its Royal cipher (E,G,V). Record O for the rare cases of no cipher.
- 3 On its collection plate will be a number (usually at the bottom, following half a postcode); collect this number and divide by 4.
 - Remainder=0: continue in the direction you were heading
 - Remainder=1: take next left
 - Remainder=2: take next right
 - Remainder=3: return the way you came
- 4 Deal with cul de sacs, loops and inpenetrable obstacles as you see fit.
- 5 ... until you've had enough.

- 5 ... until you've had enough.



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

Only to prove what a cultured place This town of ours is - isn't it?


